WOW-Day in Korea: "Students grow into world citizens"

The Waldorf School Seoul is one of eleven Waldorf Schools in South Korea. The school is joyfully taking part in WOW-Day for the third time.

2018 is the first year in which it is participating with a high school class, reports WOW-Day coordinator Narae Jeong:

"On a warm spring day, WOW-Day 2018 was held in Seoul. This year was special because we had a high school class for the first time. So 9th grade students planned the entire celebration. The WOW-Day poster was designed by a 9th grade student and shows a traditional Korean work of art. We had a small chorus in opening. 6th grade, 7th grade, 8th grade, 9th grade, and a few teachers sang. They opened the door warmly with songs, and various handicrafts and students sold food. Parents and students played badminton friendly games. And the charity marathon began. The fathers in particular helped to organize the marathon. The students ran as hard as they could for a fixed distance. After the marathon, the student band finished the day with a performance. All the members of the Seoul Free Waldorf School think it meaningful to participate in WOW-Day 2018. Students learn how to plan for themselves and students grow into world citizens. We hope the fund for WOW-Day is well spent and we can participate again next year.



WOW-Day in Poland: "We did WOW-Day for the first time and it was awesome!"

For the first time, the Waldorf School in Warsaw, the Niepubliczna Szkoła Podstawowa im. Augusta Cieszkowskiego, has been participating in the worldwide campaign day – even though the school depends on support itself.

For WOW-Day 2018, the school community decided to connect their fundraiser with the advent market, as WOW-Day coordinator Katarzyna Gutowska-Maślanka tells us:

"The charity advent market at the August Cieszkowski Waldorf School in Warsaw was a great opportunity to carry out a fundraiser as part of WOW-Day for the Waldorf initiative in Jardim to Cajuero in Barra Grande in Brazil. On that day, after the traditional celebrations of admission to Advent, there was a charity auction of hand-made items and gifts from individual donors, a DIY fair, a few different hand craft workshops, and a buffet prepared by parents with sweets, but also healthy and traditional dishes. The sale of these products was also supporting WOW-Day shares! We did WOW-Day for the first time and it was awesome! We are very proud of our students and our entire school community that they have become so involved in helping their colleagues at the Waldorf School at the other part of the world! We also have financial problems as a school, but despite of we don't have much with share with other people what we have. Next year, we will also be happy to join this wonderful and noble action!"



WOW-Day in Spain: "It has been a really nice day"

In 2018, the Krisol Waldorf kindergarden in Premia de Dalt, Spain, participated in WOW-Day for the fifth time. Zina, a mother at the kindergarten, tells us how the day went:

On 7th of October we celebrated the Fiesta de Michael. This was our sixth year that we celebrated this festival and we prepared with a very nice program of activities: A teacher's story (a Michael's story), the room has been super full of persons, we have done two artistic ateliers for families, and both were also very nice and full of people. As it is typical of our country and our families specialty we have celebrate with a very big Paella, lots of food and arts to sell between the families of Krisol, friends, and visitors. It has been really a nice day! We decided to send the Freunde der Erziehungskunst part of the earned money to help other families to access at Waldorf's Schools around the world.



WOW-Day in Czech Republic: "We look forward to next year"

In 2018, the Waldorf School in Příbram, Czech Republic, participated in WOW-Day for the fifth time. A student from class 12, Maria, tells us how the day went:

"This year, we decided to support Hekima Waldorf School in Tanzania and as usual WOW-Day was traditionally held by 12th class. Theme was nature and its protection. Preparations began two weeks before the event and the event itself started on 6th October 2018. The day began with a sunny morning and it stayed like this the whole the day. Around eight o'clock in the morning, the first sellers and organizers arrived and the 12th grade had prepared for them a pleasant background. There were a lot of sellers and with varied goods. You could choose almost everything from photos through grape to vegan specialties. Blasting was live music in service of pupils from our school and puppet theater. You could also watch the keeping and breeding of reptiles in terraria. Children could try threading beads or making scratches in our workshops. You could choose much more, for example, you could make a sword with a carpenter, magnets and blacksmiths to see their craft. The whole day was accompanied by a great friendly atmosphere. Thanks a lot to all the participants; we look forward to see you next year again."



WOW-Day in Moldovia: "The celebration brought the entire school together."

For many years, the Waldorf School in Moldova has been participating in the worldwide campaign day – even though the school depends on support itself.

Its status as a state lyceum brings some financial support, but subjects such as handicrafts, painting or eurythmy are not funded by the state. For most parents it is a great effort to contribute to the school's running costs. For WOW-Day 2018, the school community decided to organize a craft fair, as WOW-Day coordinator Natalia Vacariuc tells us: "We decided to keep up our tradition and to organize a bazaar. The school community opted to have this campaign day on October 6, 2018. Fortunately, the weather was fantastic. Not only the surrounding music, but the temperature was just as inviting. The ninth-graders set up stalls with baked goods, homemade jam, lanterns and jewelry, while the fifth-graders sold handcrafted autumnal greeting cards. The delicious smell of tasty food attracted many people and curious visitors to our schoolyard. The crisp, refreshing autumn air and the smoke of fried meat filled everybody's nostrils and lungs. Besides, our students together with parents and teachers sang, danced, played, painted and sold a lot of things. With great commitment, the twelve grade students offered a crafting workshop for children, where they could make greeting cards. Be it clothing or tasty food, there was something for everybody. In addition, the seventh grade students created a beautiful atmosphere in the whole schoolyard with a wonderful choir of beautiful crystal voices. It was like a celebration, bringing together the entire school. We are happy and satisfied that everything went well. And, by the way, how pleasant it is to think that we can help others.

We collected 300 euros, which we'd like to benefit the Goderich Waldorf School from Sierra Leone. We think that WOW Day is a wonderful idea in order to help children from poorer families and to give them a warmhearted place to learn.



WOW-Week in Germany: "An entire week of WOW"

Because the Waldorf movement is celebrating its 100th anniversary next year, the students of the Freie Waldorfschule Heidelberg have turned WOW-Day into a WOW-week, which took place from 12 to 19 November 2018.

In order to collect as many donations as possible, all classes and employees have planned various activities. The majority of the upper grade students have opted for paid work outside the school in order to donate the salary. All proceeds go to the partner school in Windhoek/Namibia. Because there are still a considerable number of children who would not be able to attend the Waldorf School without receiving financial support. In addition to the paid work of the high school students, numerous other activities took place at the school. The eighth and ninth-graders organized breakfast buffets in neighboring companies; the secretaries stuck Namibian motifs on countless matchboxes and sold them on the school grounds. The fifth class went to the pedestrian zone of Heidelberg with an information stall, where they sang, performed, and juggled. The third class had already sold handmade key rings in support of the Namibian partner school on Thanksgiving a week earlier. Last but not least, the antiquarian bookshop sold books for one week to the benefit of the Windhoek Waldorf School. The brilliant finale of the WOW-Week was the charity concert of the music group "Hit The Beat". For ten years, high school students of the Waldorf School Windhoek have repeatedly been on tour with their musical project "Hit The Beat" under the direction of Simone de Picciotto, including several muchcelebrated visits to Europe and Germany. With this concert, the group would like to thank the students from Heidelberg for their support over many years. "It was a very eventful and moving time, with many wonderful, rewarding encounters and experiences," says Ellen Fischer, employee of the Waldorf School in Heidelberg. She concludes: "We are already looking forward to "Hit the Beat" being our guest again".



WOW-Day in Italy: "WOW-Day helps us to remember who we are!"

After the huge success of the WOW-Day 2017, the Scuola Steineriana Colli Euganei continued their commitment in 2018 and organized again a beautiful lantern walk. And that for a very specific reason as Fabio Montelatici, first grade teacher, explains:

"It was a joy for us the idea of repeating the St. Martin's walk. We had a lot of new families in the School, and the walk was the first chance of the year to be together and "breathe" the atmosphere of Waldorf education. Dedicating the walk to the WOW-Day was also a special way to tell them with actions, and not only words, that our education is spread worldwide, and united in a single spirit. That's always our image when it comes to the WOW-Day. It's easy, in the everyday life of our communities, to get lost in the particular. We all have our problems to solve, our issues to cope with, and sometimes we forget who we are: branches of a single tree, spreading from the Anthroposophical Society and the Free University and taking life, colors, shapes, ideas, impulses, feelings, motivations from all the Schools around the world. Being part of the WOW-Day takes effort, in realities like Waldorf Schools which are, usually, yet busy enough. But it's worth the effort. If we don't remember who we are, we are just people frantically working in some small communities. But if we remember, if we recall, we can begin to become what we strive to be. Practice Spirit-Recalling! May that live always anew and fresh in our souls."

"Simply helping other schools"



Solveig Horst attends the ninth grade of the Rudolf Steiner School in Wuppertal, Germany. For her eighth grade project she studied Malala Yousafzai, the youngest Nobel Peace Prize winner and child rights activist. The Waldorf student then organized a fundraising campaign at her school and used the proceeds to support the Darbari Waldorf School in India, a young initiative that opens a perspective for children from poorer backgrounds. At the 27th Federal Students' Council Conference in Überlingen, Germany, our WOW-Day coordinator Jana-Nita Raker met the committed fifteen year old and talked to her about Waldorf School, WOW-Day, and her hopes for the future.

What is Waldorf for you?

When I go to another school or visit friends who also attend Waldorf School, it feels a bit like coming home. Because when you grow up with it, it's like a home.

What do you like about Malala Yousafzai?

What I like about Malala is that she had the courage and the strength to simply do what she wanted and what was important to her - and she didn't let terrorists intimidate her. And that even though she almost died after an assassination attempt, she still goes on. I admire her courage and self-confidence to stand in front of many people and voice her opinions.

How did you come to organize a fundraiser?

Since I also had to do a practical part for my eighth grade project, I decided to do a fundraiser. I organized a first campaign on the advent fair of my school. There, I collected 410 euros. On the day I gave my presentation, I collected donations again. In total I collected 555 euros. I donated the money there will be a lot less the poverty in the world. to the Friends of Waldorf Education and they forwarded the sum to the Darbari Waldorf School in India. This is a school for children of the so-called untouchables. I deliberately chose this school because it is not always a given for these people to go to school. The girls are never actually sent to school and are often married at the age of eleven. I hope the money will help the school to continue.

What happens at your school on WOW-Day?


At our school the high school students or those aged 13 and over, as far as I know, earn money for one day. The wages they receive for their work are collectively donated. The lower and middle grades have a big charity race around our school and look for a sponsor who gives them a specified contribution per lap completed.

What inspires you on WOW-Day?

I think it's just a totally beautiful thing to do, a beautiful opportunity to help other schools. Our school, for example, is doing well, we have enough teachers, enough supplies. And other schools don't. Or other schools don't even have a proper school building. And that's a good way to support it.

What are your hopes for the future?

For the future, I hope that every child, regardless of origin, whether disabled or with other limitations will receive an education. So they can find a good job later on, thanks to their education, and that



A culinary journey around the world

We created the WOW-Day cookbook as part of the 2018 campaign. From Egyptian lentil soup to Georgian flat bread to Nepalese rice pudding, the book is a culinary journey around the world and contains a variety of recipes from 20 countries. In addition, the brochure provides fascinating insights into Waldorf institutions worldwide.

Ukraine

Wareniki – filled dumplings

What you need:

400 g flour 1 egg 200 ml water 1 pinch of salt Filling as desired for example mashed potatoes, onions, sauerkraut, cherries and sour cream



How to make it:

Bring the water to a boil with a pinch of salt and mix with half the flour. Once the dough is homogeneous, add the remaining flour and the egg, mixing it to smooth dough. Roll out the dough thinly on a floured work surface and cut out circular shapes with a large water glass. Cover the cut out circles with one tablespoon of filling each. Fold the circles in the middle to form a half moon and glue the edges together by pressing them together firmly. For even better results, you can brush the edges with a little water. Cook the raw dumplings in boiling salted water, stirring occasionally. When they float on the surface, take the Wareniki out with a skimmer and enjoy them warm. You can fill the dumplings any way you like: for example with mashed potatoes and onions or with sauerkraut. Our students love Wareniki with cherries and eat them with a bit of sugar and sour cream.

Brazil Banana cookies

What you need:

2 eggs 1 cup cane sugar 200 g butter 5 or 6 peels of ripe bananas 1 tbsp. cinnamon 1 tbsp. baking powder 5 cups flour (half of which can be whole grain)

How to make it:

Mix butter, eggs, sugar and banana peels in a blender to a thick mixture. Take a second bowl and add the cinnamon, baking powder, and flour and then the thick banana mixture. Mix everything by hand to a firm, non-sticky dough. Now sprinkle some flour on the worktop or the table and roll out the dough with a rolling pin. Now you can use cookie cutters to make cookies. Place them on a baking tray lined with baking paper and bake at medium heat for about 30 minutes. Bom apetite!

In Brazil, some sweets are made with the skins of fruit. Since there are many bananas, often their peels are left over, but sweets are also produced with melon skins. Of course you can take the bananas instead of the peels and mix them with butter, eggs and sugar.

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

Egypt, Luxor Hebet el-Nil Waldorf School



Dear WOW-Day friends,

It is a great miracle for us that you think of and stand up for us! It is a beautiful gift to feel that we have big brothers and sisters. Our small three-year school between the Nile and the Egyptian desert has now built the first two houses of the emerging school village. We moved in here in November - it's beautiful!

Your donation enabled us to build a large blue school gate into the school wall. Recess is great right now, because we still have so much space to run and play on the entire construction site. But in March it gets very hot, usually between 40 and 50 degrees Celsius. The sun is burning and we urgently need trees. Your donation has made it possible for us to plant many different fruit trees: Mango, lemon, fig, orange, mandarin, gawafa, pomegranate, and in between always a ficus, because it grows very fast. Whereas at the end of January they were just sticks, now in April they are tree trunks with leaves - Trees grow so quickly here!

Hebet el-Nil Waldorf School

Even though school attendance is mandatory in Egypt, only about every third child goes to school. Especially in rural areas and in small towns, school means classes of 70 children, rote learning, and shouting answers in unison. Children who lag behind run the risk of being beaten. When the speech formation teacher and actress Nathalie Kux was in Luxor in 2015 on a cultural journey, she met a restaurant owner, who wanted something better for the children of his neighborhood, and she decided to do something about it. She built up a Kindergarten, from which emerged, just one year later, a school with a first grade. An educator and a teacher from Switzerland came to Luxor to give seminars on Waldorf education for the local teachers. In summer 2016, the kindergarten opened with 60 children, in fall 2017 a first school class started with 24 children. Now a first school building could be finished. A further construction phase is to begin in summer.



Argentinia, Buenos Aires CultivArte

Sadly, half of all children in Argentina are poor and there are few opportunities to get a good education. We at Cultivarte believe that every human being has the potential to change the world and we use Waldorf Education to find this potential in every human being. Every day after school, children come here to learn in a different way, in a way full of love, care, and hope. CultivArte

Faced with the terrible situation of the many unattended children in San Fernando, a suburb of Buenos Aires in Argentina, several former students of the Escuela Arcangel Micael decided to do something about it nearly 15 years ago. The outcome of this decision is a place where children can come and play. They can also catch up on subject material they did not entirely understand at school. Over the years, more than forty former Waldorf students have been volunteering for CultivArte, which has grown considerably in recent years. For snack there is no longer just juice and biscuits, but a nutritious meal prepared with a nutritional physiologist (mothers often ask for the recipes). A social worker helps families get in touch with local services (ophthalmologist, clinic, social worker, psychologist, etc.).



Argentina, Namandu Kyringue'i Aty Neoguanga



Mpaipareiko? How are you? Aiko Porã! We are fine and thanks to your dear donations we're are even a little better.

We write to you from northern Argentina or, to be more precise, from the beautiful province of Misiones. Many indigenous people of the Mbya Guaran tribe still live together in communities in this province. One of these communities is called ñamandu. There is a bilingual school and a Waldorf Kindergarten. This Waldorf Kindergarten is the institution in which we work. Together with two locals we are working there and are doing various activities with the children. We sing traditional songs with them, play traditional games, paint, bake bread, and tell stories. In the kindergarten we have made it our mission to make children as enthusiastic as possible about growing up in their own culture. In this way the Waldorf Kindergarten contributes to the revival of the Mbya-Guarani culture.

The kindergarten can only be maintained through regular donations. You make it possible to pay the expense allowances of Miriam and Diego, the two local kindergarten teachers, and to cover material costs. These include, for example, candles, paper, wax crayons, soap for washing hands, and watercolors. At the moment we are planning to plant local fruit trees and perennials in the area surrounding the school in order to improve the children's nutrition in the long run.

At the moment there is no water in the kindergarten and the school because the pump is broken. The project faces such challenges again and again, and we have to find creative solutions. This is why we organize the education of the children as creatively as possible. Miriam and Diego attend a Waldorf teacher training on a regular basis. The donation that we received thanks to the efforts of you students on WOW-Day will be used to pay for the teacher training. On behalf of the Waldorf Kindergarten and the school, which is located in the subtropical rainforest, 26 km away from the nearest village, we would like to thank you and in particular all the students! The donation is a great support for us!

Kyringue'i Aty Ñeoguanga

For almost two years, Elisabeth Rybak and Paula Kiefer have been building a kindergarten in Misiones in the rainforest of Argentina, as part of their voluntary service. In the indigenous village of Ñamandu there already is a school for the children of the Mbaya-Guaraní culture. While the state will not fund a kindergarten for the school, the younger children come to school anyway. Therefore, without further ado, the two volunteers founded a kindergarten. After a short time, they received support from other Argentine Waldorf Kindergartens and from Germany.

Thank you very much for the donations you collected for us on WOW-Day!



Fink Hawzien

The Ethiopian association Fink Hawzien is located in the small village of Hawzien in northern Ethiopia. The association has set itself the goal of improving the living conditions for the people in Hawzien. In particular, they focus on children's education. The kindergarten is the only larger kindergarten in Hawzien. The school they built helps to relieve the pressure on the existing school in Hawzien, in which children learn in classes of more than 80 students. The association ensures that children from all classes and especially children from poor families are allowed to attend school. The kindergarten has three groups with a total of 120 children. Today more than 200 children attend the classes one to five of the grade school. The association plans to extend the school up to eighth grade. In total, three teachers and three helpers work at the kindergarten. Six teachers and one teaching assistant work at the school. The more than 400 trees planted by Dr. Atsbaha - the chairman of Fink Hawzien - have grown in size and make the property seem like a little paradise. The water for the trees is pumped from the nearby river with the help of a mule. The cattle that are kept on the school property give the milk that the teachers hand out during recess along with the rolls from their own bakery. On the one hand the school and kindergarten curricula must meet the requirements of the Ethopian education authority, on the other hand new elements are to be introduced, such as playful learning and independent working. In addition, the kindergarten and the school try to incorporate local Ethiopian elements such as handicrafts, dances and music, as well as fairy tales and fables.

We are a project from Brazil that offers disadvantaged children and teenagers afternoon care with games, lessons, and leisure activities followed by a meal. We teach cooking, music, art, theatre, sports, and English. The children who come to us are not able to support our project financially, which means that the children and us helpers depend on donations. Already from an early age, the children here feel that there is no perspective in life. They experience violence and sometimes drug use.

Our aim is to show alternatives. After the leisure activities, which alternate daily, the children receive a lunch we prepare. A lunch that is necessary for many of them. That is why we use your donations for lunch and thus we can, at least for the time being, feed the children.

The school community of the Escola Waldorf Anael Varzea da Roca in Brazil thanks you very much for your great commitment!

We are a small Waldorf School, just ten years old, located in the remote and very dry hinterland of Salvador da Bahia. All the problems known from Brazilian cities are also present here. In addition, we are secluded from civilization and poverty reigns due to the sparse vegetation. The poor prospects for the future paralyze any passion for learning, especially among children and young people, and often lead to the well-known problems with crime. For these children, a Waldorf School is really a small paradise, where one can breathe a sigh of relief and feel accepted. They get to know another reality and learn a lot without noticing it.

In order for this "paradise" to operate, we always depend on donations. The parents cannot afford the monthly costs of the school. At best, some can provide a small contribution. Recently, a friendly donor made it possible for us to drill a well. We are very happy about this, as we can now try to grow

In the dry hinterland of Bahia, in the middle of nowhere, lies Varzea da Roça, a little town of around 15.000 inhabitants. In the 19th century, this was a recruitment area for the slave trade; today, it is a place that many people just want to get away from, because there is no work. But the people who leave end up in the slums of big cities, where they have no perspective either. A request from an inhabitant of Varzea da Roça prompted Doris and Wolfgang Knipping to visit this place. The hardship was immediately evident, and so they decided to establish a kindergarten in 2009 and a school in 2010. The kindergarten and the school are a source of hope for the future and a source of self-confidence and competence. By now, the facilities are run by locals. But all of this has to be maintained. This is still only possible thanks to the aid of many supporters.

Dear students,

We were delighted to receive your donation. With this money we are going to repair the roofs of the wood workshop, the library, and the office. Last year, it rained a lot and some of our rooms were flooded.

The Guainumbi institution works with mentally and physically handicapped people who come from socially weak and often difficult family backgrounds. Many had traumatic experiences. In some families there is a lack of basic things, such as food and sometimes running water and electricity. Unfortunately, they have often lost one or even both parents.

About 100 students attend our institution. The children are divided into two groups; one comes in the morning and one in the afternoon, each group having five classes. Each group has three joint meals. In the classes we work therapeutically with the students. We bake, make music, and dance together. We also offer work in the vegetable and herb



garden, the wood workshop, the weaving mill, and other artistic activities. We also help them to read, write and do arithmetic.

We are all very grateful for your donation. Your support is very important to us and is an incredibly big help.

The social therapeutic institution Guainumbi is located on the outskirts of São Paulo in Brazil. Brazil, são Paulo Circus Ponte das Estrelas



Dear WOW-Day protagonists,

On the stage there is a pyramid of children. A call of "and HEPP!" sounds over the heads of the audience. The children look into the audience, with raised heads and shining eyes. Then, within seconds, the pyramid is dismantled; the children run out, behind the curtain and come out for the roaring applause. But then they start to build a bridge out of single wooden sticks. Without any screws the parts lay into each other. When the bridge is finished, the children come to the front of the stage. Now they just stand there singing their circus song, the end of each performance. It is very quiet in the hall: the children look around and sing - the audience looks at the children, with shining eyes, some already know the song and sing along, many a spectator also has tears in their eyes.

Those who come to a performance of the circus Ponte das Estrelas, which translates to Star Bridge, have now seen a performance of theatre and circus acts on stage. The children juggled with balls, clubs and rings, skipped three, even four ropes at the same time, and all of this while riding a unicycle! The brave bear act made the audience laugh, and the giraffe, which was as big as a real one, drew the children out of the front rows - because everyone wanted to stroke it! No one thinks about where the children on stage came from anymore, because what they showed was simply great and touching! It doesn't matter whether we are on stage at a public school in São Paulo, perhaps at the school of one of our artists, where he is ridiculed and bullied as a school failure, or whether we are at a Brazilian private school, attended by the children of diplomats; in an institution in the midst of the favelas, where children have never seen a theater performance before, or on a very special tour through Germany.

The Circus Ponte das Estrelas is aimed at children between the ages of 12 and 18 who are in danger of losing their lives. They come from the outskirts of São Paulo; violence, crime, murder squads, drug and human trafficking are their immediate environment. We meet daily for our circus and theatre practice... but we also simply practice living together. This requires courage and training because of the difficult experiences each child brings with them. In addition, there is a lot of art and music. On weekends we have a sleepover and set up a show from "nothing". We perform this show during the holidays. If everything went well, at the end of a year we will have made costumes and animals from old clothes; vague ideas, conflicts and questions within the group will have led to a story that also applies to the whole world; and individually practiced tricks will have turned into colorful circus acts. All these things then come together to make a performance. The children are transformed into real stars.

We thank you very much for your effort and support! With your donation we buy jam, peanut butter (our favorite breakfast), flour for the bread we bake every week, but also sewing thread for aprons, tablecloths, and costumes, cleaning supplies to keep our house beautiful. In short, the donation helps us with all those things that silently and quietly transform children into stars, children who have been tortured by fate for a long time.

From the bottom of my heart I would like to thank you for your WOW-Day donation!

Maybe you remember: In our small centre in Ghana there are twelve children now, all of them have quite a handicap. They are looked after by Ayala, our housefather and teacher, and by three mums, who cook for everyone on an open charcoal fire and wash mountains of laundry by hand with cold water every morning.

The children didn't have a good life before they came to our centre. They are really the poorest of the poor: Many people in Ghana think that a child who was born with a disability brings misfortune to the whole family; yes, they even believe the child is bewitched. Immediately after birth, the child is usually brought to a river and left there. Some children are also kept hidden in the furthest corner of the house, often tied with a rope.

With us the children not only get three healthy meals, as well as clothes, a mattress, and a mosquito net; we even started a few years ago with a small school. Ayala teaches them the letters, practices arithmetic with them, and yes, we even introduced




form drawing. At the end of the lessons, the children usually hear an old Ghanaian tale. Afterwards, our three oldest children practice weaving on small school weaving frames, which I brought them. The joy with which our children go to school is hard to describe...

Escuela Caracol

The name of the Escuela Caracol Waldorf School, which translates as 'the snail's shell', gives us a clue to the vision behind this school located in the village of San Marcos La Laguna, and the close relationship of this school to Maya culture: spiral forms symbolize the connections between life's manifold facets, and life as a whole. Around 120 children from Maya families and from families who have emigrated from the USA learn three languages: Kaqchikel, the Maya language, Spanish and English. The Escuela Caracol became the first ever school in the modern period to teach in Kaqchikel, and now state schools have followed its example. The majority of the parents from indigenous families have very low incomes and thus the tuition fees are hardly enough for the necessities of every day school life.



Haiti start international

Dear students,

Thank you very much for supporting our project in Haiti with your donation.

This makes the children, teachers, and parents there, as well as us very happy. Only together can we change the world and the situation of children in different countries of the world. Without you and the help of other students this would not be possible.

Haiti is a beautiful country in the middle of the Caribbean Sea. Usually it is very hot: 35-40 degrees Celsius. It is the poorest country in the northern hemisphere. Of course, there are also a few rich people - very rich people. But there are very few of them. Most people are terribly poor. They live in huts and have very little to eat. Usually the children fetch water for the family at the well before school; then they run to school. Their way to school often takes one to two hours.

We have been in Haiti since the earthquake in 2010. Since 2012, we have been working with the children, teachers, and parents at various schools in the country. As in many countries, the teachers have not received any training. Many do not have a high school degree, have never attended teacher training or university.



Most people have no idea that school and learning can be fun and that students and teachers can go through life together. While a few years ago there was virtually no time to play, not even for the kindergarten children, there are now fixed play times every day. There is also a lot of singing, the children play circle games, and build toys from natural materials. The older students no longer only have to learn by heart. They are allowed to use their own heads, discover how mathematics works together with their teachers, what physical laws are, learn languages when playing theatre. All this was unthinkable just a few years ago. At that time, every child had to take 17 books with them already to kindergarten.

Many children live alone, without parents, because they have gone to the city to work. The children eat rice and beans, the same thing every day. Often they get their only meal of the day at school. Your donation helps us to continue our journey together with the people of Haiti. And more and more schools can become places of life for human development, places where children can feel safe and develop freely. This will take many hours, many training seminars and a lively exchange among all those involved.

Madagascar start international

Dear students,

How can one imagine this country? Madagascar is the fourth largest island in the world and is situated in the Indian Ocean - so to speak next to Mozambique in southern Africa. The people speak Malagasy, some also French. Our project is located 30 km from the capital Antananarivo. The landscape there is covered with rice fields - as far as the eye can reach. Most people live in mud houses. Even if nature is beautiful, Madagascar is unfortunately one of the poorest countries in the world. All wealth and all power lie in the hands of a few families. Most people are completely poor. In the countryside, they work in the rice fields from morning till night.

Many children wear torn clothes and walk barefoot. Shoes are a luxury. Early in the morning the children fetch water or wood for the family, they take the cows out or take the ducks to the river. Often they eat only once a day.

In such a rural area the Canadian Kathryn Lucking started a small school initiative about 10 years ago - to enable children to learn at a place like this and

to build hope for the future. For four years, we have been supporting Kathryn at her request in the construction and expansion of the school and the teacher training.

For as in many places on earth, here too most of the teachers are not prepared for educational work with children. Many have little more than a school-leaving certificate, cannot afford teacher training and often only know school as a place where children have to learn by heart and are beaten. From these beginnings the school has grown to about 800 students today.

The school is showing the first signs of becoming a Waldorf School. The students are given more space and time to play, to move, and to discover and understand connections for themselves. In order to achieve this, stART works directly with the children as well as with the teachers. Together we design the classes and give seminars. In this way, the school is gradually becoming a place for real learning - a place where children and teachers can move and develop freely.

For two years now, teachers from other schools have also been able to participate in some of our training seminars. Through this, the school is more and more becoming a learning center for the entire area, a model place for how school can be different.

South Africa, Cape Town Zenzeleni Waldorf School



Dear students,

Thank you so much for your great donation to our school. You must all have worked very hard to achieve so much. We feel very blessed that such a distant school thinks of us and supports us.

We are a primary school in Khayelitsha, Cape Town's largest township with 500,000 inhabitants. A township is a place where there are many unconventional dwellings made of corrugated iron. We have 271 Children from kindergarten to seventh grade and are the only school in the area that does not have an official school uniform. In the beginning, before the children got used to the fact that we don't have a school uniform, they teased us and told us that we were still in kindergarten because only kindergartens don't have a school uniform.

We are very proud of our school and belong to the best in Khayelitsha. We also have a few students who take violin lessons, funded by the Cape Town Orchestra. We love to sing and dance and all African festivities include a lot of singing and dancing.

Since last year Cape Town has been suffering from a serious water shortage because we didn't have enough rain. We have indeed prepared ourselves to have no more water, and people have desperately tried to replenish their water reserves. Each person was only allowed to use 50l per day. We focused very much on how we can save water and became aware of how much we consume.

We will use the donations you collected for us as follows:

- One part will help to open the school to children from very poor circumstances, where the parents do not have any work.

- A part is used for our art space in a shipping container, where a young man works, who went to our school, and who now wants to create a space for us to create art in our free time when we feel stressed and unhappy or just need some rest.

- The rest will be invested in school materials, such as reading books, stationery, etc., and recorders. We would also like to buy two water tanks.

Dear Waldorf students from all over the world,

Many thanks from all the students of the Centre for Creative Education for your commitment and hard work that has enabled us to complete the teacher training.

We are a group of 93 women of different ages, some of us mothers and grandmothers, who mainly come from the townships around Cape Town. We come to the Centre twice a week to practice arts and crafts. We have a lot of fun discussing what we've learned, trying out morning circles, and making toys for the kindergartens where we work or volunteer.

Most of us have never experienced Waldorf Education before, but we are convinced that it is the best education for our children. We want to make a difference for the children in the township by providing them with a safe and secure environment and a space where they can play freely and imaginatively.

Only 25 percent of children in South Africa can go to kindergarten, because there are not enough kindergartens or teachers. Since most mothers and fathers have to work, the children are not adequately cared for during the day.

The WOW-Day donation makes it possible for us to become educators, because we do not have a sufficient income to finance the training costs.

The kindergarten teachers of the township earn very little (800 Rand) per month; that is about 50 euros. Therefore, we are very grateful for your support. Without this, the Centre for Creative Education would not be able to offer this training.

Today our school is in a difficult situation, because the state gives only 7.70 euros per month for each child. From this amount we have to pay the salaries of the teachers and everything that is needed to run a school, such as electricity costs. Our school is small but the amount is not enough to cover all costs. Therefore, the sole curative school in Georgia works only thanks to donations. Despite financial difficulties, the Michael School continues its work.

Since its inauguration in 1994, the Michael School for Curative Education is the only school for children with special needs in Georgia. The house of the curative education initiative is situated in the center of Tiblissi. The school is funded according to the same rules that apply to every regular school in Georgia: Around 30 children are expected to be in one class. But if there are only six or eight children in one class, the school only receives the corresponding fraction of the usual funds. This amount is so small that the teachers can't make a living, not even in Georgia. This is why the school needs continuous support, to maintain the valuable work of our teachers, who have a lot of experience in education and therapy.



Georgia, Tbilisi Daycare Center

Dear children,

Our institution is called Daycare Center for Social Therapy. It is located in Tbilisi, the capital of Georgia. We are a working community. In our workshops we work together with 50 people who need special care and with 21 employees. We make different things from wood, paper, and wool. We make candles and notebooks, and we print books. We have a large kitchen where we prepare lunch for the whole community. We also have a garden with trees and flowers. And we also have animals - dogs and bees.

Together we not only work, but also do many artistic activities, such as music, eurythmy, painting and sculpting. Before Christmas, before Easter and in summer we organize markets in the day-care center, where many guests visit us and buy some of our homemade objects. Our workshops also have customers who place orders. In our paper workshop we produce notebooks for the Tbilisi Waldorf School.



We are happy to be together during the day and to do useful work. Without the daycare center, our people with special needs would be sitting at home alone without anything to do. In the daycare center they have friends, their own work and their lives are full of meaning. We are happy when guests come to us and buy our products - so we see that our work was not for nothing. We are also happy to visit different places and events and to talk to different people.

Day care center

The day care center for social therapy in Tbilisi, the capital of Georgia, looks after people in need of special care. The small amounts that parents can pay and the proceeds from the sale of their own products are hardly enough to cover the costs.

As you surely know, here in the Thar Desert we have opened a Waldorf School for the poorest part of the population. Apart from the fact that these people are poor, they are Dalits, which means they are casteless. They are often called untouchables. In addition, here in our area, school is the only way to avoid child marriages. Girls are still often married at 13, 14 years of age despite the Indian law passed 18 years ago that prohibits child marriages. Yes, here, in the Thar Desert, the traditions are

Darbari Waldorf School

In northwestern India there is a very young Waldorf school for children of the Bhil people, one of the most populous indigenous tribes in India. Despite the official abolition of the caste system, the local families are still excluded from society and live in extreme poverty. At school, children experience respect and learn to trust in themselves.

Mbagathi Waldorf School

Nairobi is a progressive city. However, large parts of the population are fighting for survival. Finding work is difficult, and often people are struggling to pay for food, rent, and clothing. The children of Mbagathi School often come from difficult family situations. It is not uncommon to have children whose parents are separated, deceased, or suffer from AIDS. The Mbagathi Waldorf School has been constantly growing since its inauguration in 1992. Today, the school takes care of 300 girls and boys, of whom 90 are living in the school's boarding home. The teaching staff consists mainly of Kenyan teachers, but international colleagues support their work now and again. The school has to deal with an increasing number of applications from parents who are basically not able to afford the tuition fees. Educational sponsorships are an important help for the school since 95% of the parents can only afford to pay very little in tuition, if anything at all.



Colombia, Medellín Arca Mundial

Dear students,

The Fundación

...is an institution for children, teenagers, and adults who have a disability. There are five groups where the children learn, do carpentry, weave or make jewelry. There is also a bakery, a pottery and a painting studio.

The work is important

... because there are very few facilities for people with disabilities in Colombia.

Most institutions charge a lot of money, so poorer families look after their disabled children and adolescents at home. Often they sit in front of the television all day and feel useless. It is important for the Fundación Arca Mundial to show everyone that they can contribute something meaningful and that the community is important.

Through the generous donation

...we were able to buy new dining tables and chairs. The old tables were very unstable and broken, and there were no larger chairs for the adults.



What counts for us is,

...that anyone can attend the institution. Therefore, everyone pays accordingly to the income of the parents. So some parents only pay the money for the food. Some families need help to pay the transportation costs, so that their children arrive safely at the Fundación. The most important thing is that everyone is welcome and that the members of the community help one another - especially with the daily problems that automatically arise in a group.

We have three meals a day in the Fundación - in the morning and afternoon there is a snack from the bakery and at noon we have a warm meal together from our own kitchen. Before each meal, we say thanks together. We also think of you, because you made it possible for us to sit on sufficient and comfortable chairs and to eat from stable and beautiful tables.

The history of CES Waldorf dates back to 1997 when a group of social workers together with Helmut von Loebell, an industrial manager who has been living in Colombia since 1956 and is co-founder of other social projects in Bogotá like the SOS Children's Village Colombia, avoided the eviction of the dwellings of 36 refugee families and achieved their peaceful relocation to the Sierra Morena neighbourhood in Ciudad Bolívar. In Sierra Morena the social workers familiarised the relocated families with the general requirements of an organised community life and helped the children with their academic processes. Inspired by Waldorf education, CES Waldorf offers a unique educational and social program. Through arts, culture as well as medical and psychological assistance, it offers children, adolescents and their parents the opportunity to cope with their difficult living conditions, characterised by extreme poverty, drug abuse and violence, and to fulfil their wish for a dignified life. Despite the donations of several public and private organisations from Europe and Colombia, raising new funds for the operating and maintenance costs remains a daily challenge.

Kishinew Waldorf School

Their own school building is bursting at the seams. An additional floor is urgently needed. Every year the number of applications far exceeds the number of students that can be admitted. A further great problem is the lack of trained teachers, especially for the foreign language education in German, English, and French. The school's status as a state lyceum does bring some financial support, but subjects such as handicrafts, needlework, painting or eurythmy are not financed by the state. Only with great effort are the parents able to pay a part of the regular costs of schooling. So far, further rooms have remained a dream for the school community.

Namibia, Windhoek Windhoek Waldorf School



Dear students,

Our school will be 20 years old next year. It is the only Waldorf School in Namibia. We have two kindergartens and 13 classes. From the 8th to the 11th grade the students learn a lot of practical skills, as these are very important for vocational training. All children at our school can sing and do this with joy.

Our students come from all cultural and social strata of Namibia, because it is our principle that a school child must not be rejected if the parents or guardians cannot pay the school fees. Disadvantaged parents pay depending on their financial capabilities. This concept does not exist at any other private school in Namibia.

The school finances itself through donations, sponsorships and various promotional activities. Three times a year there is a fundraising day at the school in which as many parents, teachers, and students as possible participate. Small events like a sponsored run, taking part in the public market coffee in Windhoek, or a reading day are a drop in the ocean but important for keeping parents, teachers, and students together.

Because we have so many children from financially weak families, we are very happy about your donation. It helps us to continue the school and also to give those children who are disadvantaged a chance for a broader education.

Dear successful WOW-Day campaigners,

The students in Nepal send you a huge thank you. You have achieved something very special with your money: you co-financed two new classrooms on the roof of the Shanti leprosy relief workshop building. They replace the rooms that fell in ruins in the great earthquake on April 25, 2015.

Why has it taken so long for construction to get underway, you will certainly ask. Unfortunately, we were only able to obtain the building permit after a long, long wait, after numerous enquiries to the authorities. It was very frustrating.

But yesterday the concrete ceiling was poured. Finally I can tell you how helpful your donation to Shanti is. You have made sure that we can build in an earthquake-proof way. Because you can certainly imagine how scared we are of another great earthquake. We have bought strong reinforcing irons Shanti School, get food and have a bed. We thank with your donation and mixed the concrete with a lot of cement. The Shanti School is attended by children of leprosy patients and very poor people, who have no money to send their children to school. School in Nepal usually costs a lot.

I'll tell you the story of a small Boy, Rajiph, who lives with Shanti. Both parents are alcoholics. They gave him too little to eat, so Rajiph hasn't grown



in two years. He went to Shanti Kindergarten, but he wanted to go to school. Because he is so tiny, the teachers said he wasn't ready to go to school. But then our doctor saw that Rajiph was smart and enthusiastic about learning, and we came to the conclusion: Rajiph will probably stay small, but he must be allowed to learn. Small stature is the fate of 36 percent of the children in Nepal. Because they often have to go hungry, they are underweight and too small for their age. So I placed Rajiph in first grade. Look how happy he is! Rajiph sits in the middle and wears a checkered shirt. When I arrived in Nepal, he was so kind as to help out when the children painted the wall of our water tank. Everyone at Shanti likes the cheerful boy. We give him lime and a snack, and everyone wants him to grow like his classmates.

The solidarity of fellow human beings like you makes it possible for the children of poor people to attend you from the bottom of our hearts.

Dear Students,

we were so excited to learn that you worked hard and supported our school with WOW-day funds. This means so much to us in our far-away school in Iloilo, Philippines. Our school is 15 years old and has 290 students from kindergarten to Class 12. The school campus is on a farmland that is covered with high grasses, trees and bamboo and there is a creek that flows around the boundary of the property. This is where our students like to take their nature walks. Our school name, Gamot Cogon, literally means "grass roots". We even have a special kind of owl that makes its home in the grass on our property. It is called a "grass owl." We also have many other wildlife that like our nature setting. These include snakes, large monitor lizards, geckos, kingfishers and of course many insects like bees and butterflies. If you were ever able to visit us you would surely like to try all our tropical fruits like mangoes, papaya, bananas, pineapple and so many more that grow here.

Many of our students come from the local farming community, from families that have very few resources and who are considered poor. Many of them walk to school because their houses are nearby. We make special arrangements so that they can attend the school just like the children from other families coming from the city which is 20km away. These students ride our school bus or in vans driven by other parents. We just finished our school year in the last days of March, 2019. Our holidays are during April and May. These are the hottest months here and it is the time when there is almost no rain. Now that we have started the new school year, the rains have also returned and everything is green. Our school still has so many needs and this is why we appreciate the help from our Wow-Day friends! Because we take in so many children from poor families, we have to get help from outside so that we can operate the school, pay our teachers and purchase supplies. We also need help with our building projects. The funds that you raised this past year will be used to help us finish building an outdoor work classroom for woodwork, metal work and practical activities that might make a lot of noise! We also plan to build new playgrounds and especially a climbing wall that the students have been asking for. We will also use some of the funds to buy art supplies like Stockmar crayons and paints. We work hard to stretch the funds so that we can get as many of the things we need as possible.

We are including some pictures of our school and especially the practical arts building that we are finishing with the donated funds. We want to install a roof on the building and that is our current project. The playground will follow. We hope you like the pictures. And we wish to thank you all for helping us with our projects.

At Hekima we teach everything that today's students need in life, from English to mathematics and science to woodwork, theatre and singing. Our students are all treated equally, regardless of their origin, and they enjoy the same education in the same classrooms.

Sponsors from all over Europe make this possible, by providing the children from disadvantaged families with the opportunity to participate in the same classes as others. From day one, our children have the chance to be children, to learn with love. For some there is the possibility of escaping poverty through education. Many families can't afford a car or motorcycle to take their children safely to school. To ensure that the children stay away from the dangerous roads of this country, the school offers a shuttle service.



is large, one of the fastest growing in the world, and so the buses need to cover a large area to ensure a safe journey for all. Therefore, children have long commutes, sometimes up to three hours, so that they can only spend some time with other friends on the weekends. Some don't even see the daylight when they go to school and they come back after sunset. In order to make the trips shorter, the school decided to organize another bus so that the existing ones can cover shorter distances.

Thanks to your hard work and generous donation our school finally got another bus, which will give the children more free time in the near future.

But the bus won't be the only change made possible by your WOW-Day work. Children from Europe often think of Africa as the driest continent of all and imagine pictures of the Sahara when they are told about Africa. And although Africa has much more to offer than just dust and sand, it is still a problem to find fresh water. To escape the drought, the school will dig a groundwater well so as not to be dependent on the waterworks. This will help our school in the future to bear fruit and keep the gardens green. It all became possible thanks to your work.

The Hekima Waldorf School In Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, was founded in 1997 and today has almost 200 school children, 20 per cent of which are orphans. In Tanzania, the educational situation up to now has been very bad; sometimes, there were large classes with 100 children, and physical punishment was also common. Almost one third of all children did not graduate from primary school.



Ukraine, Charkiw Curative education Phönix School

Curative education School Phönix

The Phoenix School was founded 10 years ago, as the first school of curative education in Ukraine. Children with severe or multiple severe disabilities attend this school. Through the lessons, they get the opportunity to learn and with the help of numerous artistic projects as well as other activities, such as excursions or concerts and plays, they can experience themselves as full members of society.
